# **GOING FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH**

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## Report on Trustees' visit to Nkwanta in November 2017 by John Horseman and Julie Robinson

We arrived in Nkwanta on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> November and spent Sunday walking the school site and meeting some of the staff. The new building was progressing well, with over 100 parents on site helping to level the floors for screeding. On Monday we were greeted with the usual excitement from the girls and thoroughly enjoyed hearing them sing in Assembly. They lead assembly themselves and always sing the national anthem and make their pledge to Ghana.

We were lucky enough to be at the school for the annual prize giving. We were treated to lovely singing from the choirs, a dancing display (and a lot of formalities), and we were delighted to present the girls with their prizes.

We have many new staff, who all seem very keen and professional. Gill works with our head teachers to identify high calibre teachers for KGS. The new ICT suite that now has internet connection is being well used, but we are currently short of a qualified ICT teacher.

We visited some of the girls in their homes. Within minutes of being home the girls are changed and are drawing water from wells, preparing food, washing, sweeping and so on. This is all before any homework is completed. In the morning they are up at 4 cooking, sweeping and collecting water, before a bucket shower and a 4km walk to school for some girls. It is noticeable that only the girls in the family are expected to do the chores. The change in Government provides us with some challenges. In theory senior high school is now free to all pupils entering from 2017 onwards. Boarding and food is also free and, although boarding conditions in government schools are very crowded and pastoral care limited, boarding may seem less onerous for the girls than their lives at home that we witnessed.

We lost many of our brighter girls at the transition to SHS and some of the girls we have taken into SHS this year are struggling with basic literacy. We discussed a plan with Gill to get these girls up to a level of literacy that will enable them to benefit from what KGS has to offer.

We very much hope the government can sustain this support for senior education. In the meantime we need to adapt and find ways to encourage girls to stay at KGS for SHS so they can continue to progress as they have been doing in our JHS. We have maintained our position as the fourth highest school in the district for performance at BECE this year.

We have lots to think about but KGS remains a happy and secure learning environment where teachers give of their best to offer the girls an education that will equip them for further education or employment when they leave.

## **End of Year report from Gill Norris**

After our incredible exam results in 2016 (with a BECE pass rate of 100%), we awaited the current results with some trepidation. When the provisional results came out, every school in the district seemed very low, but we finally learned our pass rate was 77.6%, better than we had expected and we had maintained our position in the district.

The new government then introduced a policy of free education, providing accommodation and food for senior schools. As we were not yet registered we did not qualify for any assistance and we feared that girls would not come to us. But they did, in slightly lower numbers than expected, but similar to the previous year. The government placed some students with us with very low scores in BECE and we were concerned when we first started enrolling girls – but once in class, the girls have seemed to perform much better than their grades suggested.



Last term we again won the district drama competition and also the choral section and we were looking forward to the Regional finals, but there was no funding to hold the finals so our expectations have been put on hold for the moment.

Construction on the new classrooms was progressing well and we were planning to open and use the building early in the new year. The masons had started on the floor and plastering only to find that there was no cement to buy anywhere in Nkwanta. They found three bags with friends and managed to finish the design block windows so, luckily, two classrooms are nearly ready... but without ceilings yet!

We have had a lot of support from Stephen Tsuaitorfe, the education director for Nkwanta. He has pushed to make sure we have good teachers and is at the forefront of fighting for our absorption into the central system.

So it has been a strange year and typical of the difficulties of living in rural Africa, where nothing is simple or predictable.
