The next big challenge! – The Girls' School is nearly finished – Are you able to help us fund the pupils?

The campaign was launched in Spring 2012. Funds are needed to support 300 places at the new High School Girls in Nkwanta. Each place will cost £300 per annum and regular monthly donations are being sought. The charity is looking to raise money from various different sources, including Individual, Community, Business and School Partners, as well as support from Trusts and Foundations.

Thanks go to our new Community Partners, Romsey Bird Table, and to TWGGS parents who responded to an appeal letter circulated by the school at the end of the 2012 Summer term. 

Update on the New High School for Girls in Nkwanta



The Junior High School is nearly complete and the next task is to begin furnishing the first classrooms and staff areas.

The school will open in September 2013 for 75 girls aged 11 and 12. With the help of the Ghana Education Service, we plan to identify girls with potential from all the rural communities in Nkwanta South to take up these places.

There are 108 rural community schools in Nkwanta South from which to choose these first pupils. In these remote villages the number of girls attending school in their final year of basic education is already extremely small. With supported places at our school we aim to encourage pupils to complete Senior High School at age 17.

Each year from 2013 the intake will increase until the school is at capacity of over 300 pupils.

REPORT FROM TUNBRIDGE WELLS GIRLS GRAMMAR SCHOOL By Ella Morris of the TWGGS Ghana Team 2012



During our stay in Nkwanta, we spent time in primary schools teaching Maths, Geography and English. We loved seeing the enthusiasm and willingness to learn of children who have so few opportunities in life. The rest of the time was spent in the junior high school, where we focussed lessons on Aesop's fables using them to develop English skills, as well as trying to help the children to be creative and use their imagination. This was challenging as very little emphasis is placed on independent learning in Ghanaian schools. We also organised sports each evening at the Kyabobo Centre, a lovely way to get to know the children. It really was the experience of a lifetime. We learnt what it is like to truly be part of a team: working together to fundraise, plan lessons, and look after one another. We now realise just how lucky we are in this country to have opportunities, especially in education, compared to those that exist for girls in Ghana. Our endless fundraising really paid off, we were thrilled to learn that we have surpassed our target amount, raising over £53,000 for the Ghana Education Project. This, and an incredible three weeks, would not have been possible without the continued help and support of Mr Breeze, Miss Muddle, Dr Brimsted, Julie Robinson, and all of our parents, for which we are hugely grateful.
