HURRAH! OUR SCHOOL IS OPEN!





After more than five years of fundraising, building and meticulous planning, the new Kyabobo School for Girls welcomed its first intake of 80 enthusiastic girls last month!

Over the past six months, Gill Norris and her team in Nkwanta have finished the main building, secured the site with fencing, installed a full suite of computers and built the first five teachers' bungalows. A huge shipment of donated furniture and equipment arrived from the UK, teachers were sourced via our new partnership with the Ghana Education Service (GES) and most importantly, our first group of pupils were recruited to start school in mid-September.

We have high hopes for the school and our first classes of enthusiastic girls and the GEP Trustees are hugely grateful to the many generous supporters who have made this exciting project possible.

LATEST CONTAINER SHIPMENT

At the start of July, a team of willing volunteers, trustees and strapping lads gathered at TWGGS and Tunbridge Wells Boys' Grammar School to carry out the mammoth task of loading a 40ft container with furniture & equipment to be shipped out to Ghana for the new school. The container was generously donated for the fourth time by **Brian Gibson of Ibex Commodities**, to whom GEP is extremely grateful for his many years of support.

The container arrived in Ghana at the end of July and then took a while to get it out of the port and up on its epic journey to Nkwanta. The whole shipping process was generously supported by **OLAM International** in Accra, who offered to help with importing and the onward transport for the second time in two years.

GEP would like to thank the following schools for their kind donations of furniture and other school equipment: The Discovery School, Kings Hill School, Skinners Kent Academy, Riverhead Infants' School, Claremont School, Dartford School, Fonthill Lodge, Temple Hill Primary School, St Leonards-Mayfield School and Tunbridge Wells Girls' Grammar School.

Thanks also go to **Tunbridge Wells Boys' Grammar School** for providing use of their car park for loading the container.

The girls, who will be in years 11 & 12 by the time they depart, will be accompanied by Mr Matthew Breeze, a Geography Teacher and experienced traveller who led the 2012 team and accompanied the 2010 team, and Miss Henny Spokes, a Spanish teacher. On the trip, they will teach at the new girls' school and other village schools before spending a week travelling around the south of the country. In the 15 months running up to the trip, the team will be working hard to fundraise for the building of the science block and running costs of the new school. They have a hard act to follow as the 2012 team fundraised over £50,000!

BIG THANKS TO VOLTIC (GH)



In May 2013, Voltic (GH) Limited presented GEP with a cheque for GHC 20,000 (approx. £7000) to support our long-running Nkwanta Students Award and other ongoing initiatives such as improving human resource training for teachers and equipment procurement.

VISIT TO THE UK FROM THE GHANA EDUCATION SERVICE (GES)

In April, the charity's founder, Gill Norris, visited the UK accompanied by Anaafi Frederick 'Fred' Birikorang, a member of the Ghana Education Service (GES).

During his visit, the UK trustees met with Fred and agreed that GES would fund the teachers for the new Kyabobo School for Girls in Nkwanta. After detailed discussion, it was decided that a partnership between GES and GEP would be highly beneficial for both parties, ensuring the long-term sustainability of the school through GES funding for teachers salaries, while allowing GEP to ensure that the school is well run and equipped, teachers are motivated and good in-service training can be provided for the staff.

Aside from spending time with family, a spot of sightseeing and a visit to the theatre in London, Fred also shadowed a Year 7 form group at TWGGS for a day and spent some time at Langton Green, Claremont and St John's Primary Schools. He investigated how finance, PSHE and assessment are carried out in the UK. GEP would like to thank all the schools who helped to give Fred a useful insight into the British education system. He had a valuable time here but he found the English spring weather just a bit too cold!

FUTURE INITIATIVES

Alongside our work at the new Kyabobo School for Girls, Ghana Education Projest is aiming to develop a new programme for Kindergartens, to help teachers give a more practical "learning-through-play" experience to the children.

We also hope to introduce a Health Education programme to basic schools: to cover all aspects of development from Primary 4 to Junior High School 3.

In addition, GEP plans to continue to deliver in-service training to teachers, to run the Nkwanta Award and to support community groups to be more self-sufficient and hence more sustainable into the future.
