## KYABOBO SCHOOL FOR GIRLS: THE STORY SO FAR...

This has been an eventful first six months for the new Kyabobo School for Girls, with some significant triumphs under our belt in terms of reaching some key milestones and securing major support.

The government's Ghana Education Service (GES) have provided the school with some excellent teachers, who are working extremely hard in the classroom and are very active in running a range of extra-curricular clubs for activities such as drama, poetry recital, dance and singing.

Our first intake includes some very promising students, whom we must bring to their full potential - but we also have some girls who can barely read, so there are significant challenges ahead. In Nkwanta district, only 14% of girls passed their Basic Education Certificate this year (the lowest for some time) and we are aiming for at least 70% of our girls to be successful in 2015. We are teaching them to be more confident in class and they are much livelier than in mixed schools where the boys dominate.





The students have already sat their first exams with some girls excelling themselves. Understandably, non-readers found these difficult but we have now started a programme of one-to-one tuition with good readers helping those who struggle. The PTA raised some money to pay for our on-site playing field to be levelled, which avoids wasted time walking to the Kyabobo Centre for sports and has given us time for our new literacy hour. We have also managed to acquire equipment for a distance e-learning programme, comprising solar-powered computer links to a classroom in Accra for satellite-based teaching. Pictures and sound are sent both ways to allow questions and maximise interactivity.

We are now seeking funds to equip extra classrooms as our numbers increase over the next two years, as well as the completion of our science block. We are appealing to corporate donors as well as individual supporters and the TWGGS 2014 team to help with this. We want the girls to have all the resources necessary to give them the best chance of success and showing what they can achieve.

## IN THE GIRLS' OWN WORDS...

"I like Kyabobo Girls' School because everything which is needed for education is provided, such as books, writing tools and materials. Secondly, the teachers in the school are hardworking and dedicated and they are very kind and I like them. Thirdly the teachers teach a lot and if they teach me I understand very well. Lastly, my school is having very beautiful buildings and we students are very disciplined and hardworking and the most interesting thing is that. In this school everything is provided and we do not pay fees like other schools do. So I just like the school because I never been in such a school."

The water shortage has made this challenging, as using the bore hole to pump and carry the amount needed for making cement blocks is not easy. We are just waiting for the rains to fall on the filling sand of the foundations before we can continue the building works.
