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A Message about Dreaming from Gill Norris, Founder of the Ghana Education Project

The following message is an extract from Gill's speech at the opening of our new Science Block in Nov 2015...

We all dream. Sometimes our dreams are simple: we wish simply for happiness or for some immediate success. At other times we visualise our future: how we see change and what it will be like for us.

After living in Ghana for a few years and observing the girls in school, I was very puzzled. These wonderful young women were so quiet in class and seemed uninterested in their lessons. Their exam results reflected this: girls were not expected to achieve, so they did not.

We took groups of girls to the National Park to camp and climb the Breast Mountain and many parents and teachers told the girls they would not be able to do it. But we never doubted. We expected all would reach the summit. And they did.

That is how my vision started: these girls were failing not because of their ability but because of their lack of selfesteem. I had no trouble at all convincing my trustees in England to help the girls and bring about change for even a few in Nkwanta. Now my dream has come true. This school has over 200 students, girls brimming with confidence and a real zest for learning. They stay after class to ask question after question about what they have learned. They have developed so many talents and are not afraid of new challenges.

I hope our staff, the girls' parents and the local community are also amazed at what these girls can do. But a vision only comes to life if all involved believe it is possible, so:

Parents – Recognise your daughter's ability. Show that you are proud of her and share in her success.

Teachers – Have high expectations of your pupils. Keep in mind that they are individuals with different challenges and encourage them to express their ideas freely.

Girls – Believe in yourself and challenge yourself. Now you are running but tomorrow you must fly. But success does not come without effort, so never give up.

I thank all of you that have helped GEP to get this far: from dreaming of a Junior High School to getting ready for a Senior High School in 2016. This is no longer just our dream - but now belongs to the people of Nkwanta.

New TWGGS team get off to a flying start



In July, sixteen lucky students from Tunbridge Wells Girls Grammar School were chosen to form the next TWGGS Ghana team and spend the next 15 months planning for life-changing trip to Nkwanta in October 2016, whilst also raising funds for the charity.

The team has already packed in an impressive amount of fundraising, starting the school year with a sold-out Music Quiz, where ticket sales, raffles and the popular pudding auction all contributed to raising nearly £2,000. The very next weekend, twelve of the team (including a couple of girls from the 2014 team) waitressed at the TWGGS PTA Butterfly Ball and received a £440 donation, as well as gaining valuable waitressing skills for future fundraising events!

Several of the team have taken part in various physical challenges (such as climbing mountains and doing long distance walks), raising over \pounds 3,000 as well as spreading awareness of GEP.

They had a very prosperous three-day henna event, where TWGGS girls supported GEP by queuing up all lunch to get a (temporary) tattoo! And the TWGGS music department recently started running music lessons for teachers (taught by musical pupils), which raised £130 in the first week.

A number of the team helped sell tickets for this year's Round Table Dunorlan Fireworks in November and money raised through cake sales, leaf sweeping, and selling plum puddings is rapidly adding up.

After a very busy few months, the team are now gearing up for the exciting festive season – with GEP Christmas cards designed & printed and gift items being made to sell at gift fairs.

Thank you to everyone who has donated or sponsored already. The team are optimistic that this term was just a warm-up, and are now feeling prepared and experienced enough to raise much more in the months to come!
